2025 was a tough year. General economic uncertainty, loss of housing, and post-pandemic lifestyle changes made it difficult for some people to keep their pets.

Thanks to our efforts at continuous improvement and the generosity of our donors, **558 new families were created**—a single-year adoptions record in our 16-year history and a **29% increase** over 2024.

Strategic technology investments continue to power our tiny team to do more with greater speed and accuracy. Among last year's improvements are automations to connect prospective adopters with their local shelter partners more quickly. The result? More animals were saved, and the lives of more veterans and military families were made better with the love of a companion pet.

More than **\$109,800** disbursed through our adoption program for 'welcome home' food and supplies, making it more affordable for veterans and military families to adopt a pet in need

An ongoing effort is underway to thoughtfully strengthen shelter and veterinarian partner networks, focusing on organizations that value collaboration and shared purpose.

Partner quality continues to guide decisions over partner quantity as we progress towards the goal of programs in all 50 states. This commitment creates space to welcome back former partners who may have stepped away because of extended inactivity or the loss of a dedicated partnership champion.

Our virtual doors remain open to partners who wish to reengage and work together in service of people and pets. While the number of shelter and veterinarian partners may naturally ebb and flow, our dedication to building a strong, supportive network remains constant.
